All domestic violence and sexual assault services begin with a call to The Gateway Center for Domestic and Sexual Violence: 503-988-6400. All services in the metro region are coordinated through the Gateway Center. This includes shelter, protection orders, counsel and safety planning. You cannot access these services directly.

The <u>Gateway Center</u> provides comprehensive, survivor-centered advocacy and services within a welcoming and culturally sensitive environment.

Portland Metro Domestic Violence Resources and Information

Domestic and sexual violence, stalking and sex trafficking are all coordinated under the <u>Family Violence</u> <u>Coordinating Council</u> (FVCC). **FVCC** is a multi-agency, multi-jurisdictional forum for the coordination of domestic violence intervention efforts. The Council has over 40 member agencies, including criminal justice, health care, victim services, alcohol and drug treatment and children's service agencies.

The FVCC works to ensure the safety, well-being, and stability of all members of families - especially women and children- in Multnomah County by ending family violence This violence may include emotional, physical, or sexual abuse and is generally referred to as domestic violence. Abuse may include threats, harm, injury, harassment, exertion of power and control, terrorism, or damage to living beings or property.

The FVCC provides consultation and technical assistance to Multnomah County and the City of Portland, professionals working in the field of domestic and sexual violence intervention, and community groups who want to get involved in ending domestic and sexual violence. FVCC focuses on 5 areas: System Coordination, Policy and Leadership, Practices and Standards, Education and Training, Prevention. To receive newsletters from the FVCC, sign up here
